

Christian Joy in Face of the Cross

Philippi is considered the first Christian congregation in Europe. Its founder Paul was connected with it in a cordial relationship. Emprisoned, worried about his own future and yet hopeful, the apostle addresses „his“ community in the Letter to the Philippians, exhorts to unity and encourages a cheerful trust in God in spite of all circumstances.

Today's European Christian community has every reason to be concerned. The common house of Europe is burning, parts of it are in ruins. We are afraid of the effects of war and fear its expansion. We struggle to find ways to peace. Climate change threatens our livelihoods. We struggle over values, over justice, over the treatment of minorities and refugees. We seek our role as churches in polarized societies. And, as if all that were not enough, personal strokes of fate may be added to the mix. All in all, more a reason to weep than to rejoice?

What does „Christian joy“ mean in view of the challenges of this world? Is it a challenging, encouraging or rather impossible gift? What does joy mean for me personally? What gives me support and strength not to resign? Which spiritual ways and forms of expression can help not to despair in the face of the brokenness of this earthly world, but to draw joy and strength from the hope of resurrection? How is this joy expressed in our respective denominations?

We invite you to a confessionally diverse, joyful and thoughtful journey of discovery in the light of the cross.
